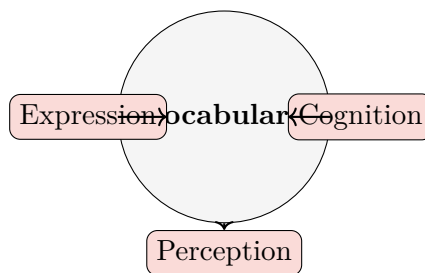

<i>adj.</i> Lasting for a very short time.

<i>v.</i> To make unclear or less visible.
Example: Fog obscured the mountain ridge by noon. |
| <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Semantics
<i>n.</i> The study of meaning in language.
Example: Legal disputes often hinge on subtle shifts in semantics. | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Cognitive
<i>adj.</i> Relating to mental processes of perception and reasoning.
Example: Cognitive decline can affect decision-making speed. |

<i>adj.</i> Expressed clearly; easy to understand.
Example: Her lucid explanation clarified the complex theory. | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Ambiguity
<i>n.</i> Uncertainty or inexactness of meaning.
Example: The contract's ambiguity led to prolonged negotiation. |
